I HEARD IT THROUGH THE GRACE VINE

On September 10, 2025, Charlie Kirk was assassinated. Now, a couple weeks later, I want to take a moment to reflect on this event. To be more specific, I want to reflect on how we as Christians respond when an event like this one takes place. First and foremost, we pray. We pray for his family, namely,

the wife and children he leaves behind. We ask that the Lord would comfort them in the midst of their grief and heartache.

We ask that He would provide for their daily needs. We ask that He would bring justice and repentance to the man who perpetrated the attack. We pray that God would use this evil for His good. We pray for our country and leaders. Simply put, we lift *everything* before God.

Second, we reflect on the reality of death and what it means. Death was never God's idea. He desired to keep us from it, but Adam and Eve ate the forbidden fruit and chose sin and death. So now we live in a world where death – even violent death – occurs on a daily basis. And yet, Jesus Christ defeated death forever when He rose from the dead on that glorious Easter morning! And because Jesus is risen (alleluia!), we as Christians have hope in the midst of death. We know that it is not permanent for us just as it was not permanent for Jesus. Though we may die one day, it will be nothing more than falling asleep in the Lord, resting in and with Him, until that day when He returns. And when He does, He will raise the dead, and we will be with Him, alive, forever. This is our hope as Christians. This also happened to be Charlie's hope.

Third, we share the Gospel. When we see something violent happen it serves to remind us that there are those out there who have no hope. Some see news like this and feel despair, as if there is no one who can save us from this valley of death. For others who do not know Jesus, news like this reminds them that *they* will one day die, and that scares them because they have no hope. In a world that reacts in this way – despairing, hopeless, without Christ – we are called to be lights. You and I can talk about the Gospel of Jesus Christ to those in our household, church, and community so that *everyone* can have the same hope in the face of death that we have. So that *everyone* can know that Jesus died and rose *for them, too*.

All of this is to say, even in the midst of violence and tragedy, it is *still* all about Jesus, who lives and reigns even still today. It is still all about Jesus, who hears our prayers, rescues from sin and death, and gives us His Words so that others may also believe.


